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Sentence in Galion drive-by shooting

BUCYRUS - A Galion man was sentenced to a minimum of 20 years in prison in Crawford County Common Pleas Court on Nov. 2 after being found guilty by a jury on a multitude of charges.

Dakota Craft, 28, had been held on a \$1 million bond after being arrested in connection with a drive-by shooting in Galion on May 23, 2023.

He was arrested on Aug. 8 as the result of an investigation by the Galion Police Department into a drive-by shooting that took place in the 400 block of Union Street.

Galion Police received a report at 5:03 a.m. on May

Crestline man sentenced

BUCYRUS - A Crestline man was sentenced in two cases in Crawford **County Common Pleas** Court on Oct. 30.

On Aug. 30, Jaquan Middleton, 22, was sentenced to five years of probation and was ordered to complete anger and domestic violence treatment after he pleaded guilty to one count of strangulation, a fifth-degree felony.

Middleton was arrested for domestic violence and violating his probation in early October. He pleaded guilty to violating his probation and to one count of domestic violence, a fourth-degree felony.

Middleton was sentenced to eight months in prison in his original case after pleading guilty to violating his probation and to the new charge of domestic violence. He was sentenced to six additional months in prison on the domestic violence charge for a total of 14 months in prison.

Middleton was also ordered to pay court costs in both cases and will receive credit for 38 days he already served in the county jail.

BUCYRUS - A Crestline man was sentenced in Crawford County **Common Pleas Court on** Nov. 2 on drug-related charges.

Ralph Hurst, 66, was arrested on April 12 during a narcotics investigation conducted by the Crawford County Sheriff's Office and the **METRICH Enforcement** Unit at his residence on Colby Road. Officers seized methamphetamine, marijuana, drug paraphernalia and cash from the home.

Hurst pleaded guilty to the charges and was sentenced to a mandatory minimum of four years and a maximum of six years in prison on one count of possession of drugs, a second-degree felony, and three years in prison on two thirddegree trafficking in drugs charges.

The sentences are to be served consecutively for a total of a minimum of 10 years or a maximum of 12 years in prison. He was also ordered to pay court costs and to forfeit any drug-related property to the Crawford County Sheriff's Office.

He will receive 204 days credit for time he has already served in jail.

Law enforcement conducts drug sweep **BUCYRUS** - Local law

enforcement from Crawford County (MET-RICH) joined forces on Nov. 3 and Nov. 4 to conduct a two-day drug/criminal saturation in known high drug areas inside Crawford County. The cataract of anti-Israel sentiment on college campuses has been shocking, but it shouldn't be surprising. It is the poisoned fruit of teaching a generation of college students to despise their own civilization.

Jesse Jackson famously led a chant at Stanford University in 1987, "Hey, hey, ho, ho, Western Civ has got to go." He was talking about the college course, but he might as well have been talking about the thing itself.

Jackson and his allies had extraordinary success in extinguishing the teaching of Western Civ. Not only have we largely stopped transmitting the story of our own civilization, we have substituted an alternative narrative that the West is reducible to racism, imperialism and

colonialism.

It is in this context that the current outburst of anti-Zionism has to be understood. Yes, it has been fed by anti-Israel agitation on campus over the decades and yes, students are susceptible to witless radicalism in the best of circumstances. Yet the loathing of Israel is particularly intense because it is viewed as an outpost of Western civilization and all its alleged ills.

The hatred of Israel is tainted by and, in some cases, driven by anti-Semitism. Another way to look at it, though, is that it's not so much about hatred of the "the other," as progressives put it, as hatred of ourselves and all our works.

It is, on one level, incorrect to consider Israel exclusively an artifact of the West. The Jews are indigenous to the region going back to Abraham, with their story caught up in the story of the land. A large proportion of the current population traces its origins from the Middle East and North Africa, rather than Europe.

But there is no doubt that Israel is a Western society in its political system, in its respects for rights, in its innovative economy, in its mores. Someone sitting in a coffee shop in Tel Aviv could easily think they were in any thriving coastal society in the West.

spective, this would be something to celebrate. Many legitimate criticisms can be made of Israel, and indeed are a feature of the Israeli domestic debate itself, but there's no doubt that it is a flourishing society.

If Gaza were equally Westernized, it would be worrying about whether it's overbuilding seaside real estate rather than having to get water and electricity from the neighboring country its governing authority - a savage terror group – is trying to destroy.

Yet this is the society that anti-Western opinion holds up and wants to sweep all before it. This point of view loves Gaza for its failure and hates Israel for its success; loves Gaza for its terror and hates Israel for its selfdefense; loves Gaza for its vicious anti-Western sponsors and hates Israel for its Western allies, especially the United States.

If this seems perverse, it's what you'd expect of students and young people who have absorbed the premises of Michel Foucault, Howard Zinn, Edward Said and their imitators. Even if students have never heard of them, these men and their thought suffuse higher education.

But what about the violence? How can these kids look past it, or implicitly endorse it?

Violence is part of the radical anti-Western vision. The anti-colonial bible, "The Wretched of the Earth," written by Frantz Fanon in 1961, is widely taught on campus. Fanon sketched out a woke worldview before anyone used that term, arguing that, as a New Yorker essay put it, "the Western bourgeoisie was 'fundamentally racist' and its 'bourgeois ideology' of equality and dignity was merely a cover for capitalistimperialist rapacity."

Fanon wrote that "decolonization is always a violent phenomenon," and in a preface to the book, the French Jean-Paul philosopher Sartre declared that the wretched of the earth "become men" through "mad fury."

By this standard, Hamas is a good and worthy anti-colonial organization, and there's no wonder it has found supporters and useful idiots among the West's selfloathing radicals.

In July of 2021, I received a book at my Bowling Green office entitled Up Close & Personal that detailed the history of a group of men serving in the Vietnam War as part of "B" Company, 720th Military Battalion, 18th Military Police Brigade.

The book came with a letter appealing for assistance with their effort to obtain the Combat Infantry Badge to recognize their unique service during the Vietnam War. While these men were classified as military police during

their service, the Battalion unofficially performed infantry missions on the front lines.

After contacting the U.S. Department of Defense and the Department of the Army to inquire as to the possibility of the group receiving the recognition, officials within the Defense Department undertook an extensive search at personnel records facilities to locate official documentation that could back up claims that the company performed infantry actions.

After months and months of research, and through documentation provided by the veterans, the Department of the Army concluded "B" Company performed actions essential to the success of the entire 720th MP Battalion during the Vietnam War. It was then announced these individuals would be recognized with Bronze Stars for their meritorious service.

To date, 66 Bronze Stars have been secured for these heroes. And earlier this year, I had the true honor of helping present the veterans with their Bronze Stars in a ceremony at the United States Capitol.

Each of these men were called upon by their nation to perform duties outside of what they signed up for, and they more than rose to the occasion. Their sacrifices, and those of their families, will never be forgotten.

As we pledge to never forget the sacrifices they made, we must never forget to thank our veterans every day not just on Veterans Day for their service.

While we will never be able to repay our veterans, we can extend our unwavering gratitude for their bravery and sacrifice. This also includes making the pledge to assist them and our servicemembers as they return to civilian Nearly 40,000 veterans



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

Harm-reduction vending machines added

GALION - Crawford County Public Health has partnered with Avita Health System to provide harm reduction vending machines outside the emergency department entrances at Bucyrus and Galion Hospitals.

These machines provide free, life-saving tools and disease prevention supplies.

The machines are stocked with naloxone (Narcan® or Kloxxado®), fentanyl test strips, athome COVID-19 test kits. male condoms female condoms. **Community members**

have 24-hour access to the machines, and all of the items are free. The machines

Bucyrus and Galion hospitals were installed on Oct. 17. In the first week, 900 free products were distributed to community members, including 199 naloxone, 302 fentanyl test strips, 236 male condoms, 67 female condoms, and 96 at-home COVID-19 test kits.

Harm reduction vending machines help reduce drug overdose deaths, as well as decrease the risk of spreading COVID-19, HIV, Hepatitis C, sexually transmitted infections, and more. They have

been used in other countries since 1987 when Denmark introduced the first one

They were launched in the United States in 2017 and have grown in prevalence as the overdose crisis has worsened over the last several years.

"In 2022, all of the Crawford County overdose deaths involved use of fentanyl, often mixed in with other drugs," said Siefert. "These machines are not meant to be an end-all solution, but they are certainly an important way to demonstrate that our community is willing to bring the tools needed to help save lives. Addressing the opioid crisis requires a community to keep doing more. More tools, more education, harm-reduction, more stigma-reduction, more more treatment, more outreach.

The machines Crawford County are funded by the Drug Overdose Prevention Grant and maintained by Project DAWN. Crawford County Public Health stocks the vending machines daily Monday-Friday but cannot guarantee availability of prod-

Free **Thanksgiving** dinner in **Shelby needs** help


SHELBY - The First Lutheran Church of Shelby will host a community-wide Thanksgiving dinner on Nov. 23.

BUCYRUS - A man who was arrested by Galion police during the search of a Riblet Street home in 2018 is headed back to prison. Scotty Patterson Jr.,

35, was originally charged with one count of possession of drugs, a fifth-degree felony, and two misdemeanor charges of endangering children and possession of drug paraphernalia in Crawford County Common Pleas Court.

The charges stem from

a search of a Riblet Street residence by Galion police, the Crawford County Sheriff's Office and the METRICH Drug Task Force. During the search, officers seized suspected synthetic marijuana as well as drug paraphernalia.

Galion woman gets prison time

BUCYRUS - A Galion woman who was sentenced to probation on June 21 on drug-related charges in Crawford County Common Pleas Court is now heading to prison.

Rosann Sturgill, 37, pleaded guilty to one count of permitting drug abuse, a fifth-degree felony, and was sentenced to five years of probation.

She was found guilty of violating the terms of her probation on Oct. 30 and was sentenced to six months at the Ohio Reformatory for Women in Marysville. She must also pay court costs and will receive credit for 32 days she has already served in jail.

Rosann Sturgill was arrested in May, along with her husband William Sturgill Sr., when law enforcement searched their Galion residence.

William Sturgill Sr. pleaded guilty to two counts of trafficking in drugs. He was sentenced to one year in prison on each count to be served consecutively for a total of two years in prison.

One fifth-degree charge of possession of drugs and one misdemeanor count of possession of drug paraphernalia were dismissed as part of his plea agreement with prosecutors.

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Concert association brings live entertainment

BUCYRUS The Crawford **County** Community Concert Association has been around longer than many local residents realize.

The non-profit organization was originally formed in 1944 and after a short break, was reborn in 1976.

"We are still going strong today and sponsor several concerts and other shows each year,' said Tom Holthouse of the concert association.

Linda Leyda is also a member of the concert association and works all year to secure musicians, singers, and other acts for the shows that are enjoyed by adults and children of all ages.

"There are two conferences that we attend that showcase different artists so we can choose which ones to showcase," said Leyda.

She said the conferences allow her and others with the association to build relationships with agents to bring in the best acts possible to the area.

"There is so much talent out there that we have been able to bring to Crawford County, said Leyda.

Holthouse said that some people ask him why the association brings in tribute artists until of the original artists.

"The one problem with that is that major artists are much too expensive for our budget. We were able to bring Glen Campbell to Bucyrus years ago. The artists we bring in are very talented and people enjoy them very much,"

Holthouse said.

Leyda said the association is working to bring in a variety of shows.

"Our audience has been older in the past but younger people are starting to come to the shows. We are trying to balance out the types of acts we bring in," said Leyda. "In the past, we have not only had musical shows but also other types of acts, such as a ventriloquist and a magic show.'

The association is funded by local organizations and individuals in addition to ticket sales for each show.

The latest show will feature American Idol Star Tristan McIntosh and a full live band that will feature the songs that Linda Ronstadt was famous for as part of the Linda Ronstadt Experience on Monday, Nov. 13.

The lineup of songs spans Ronstadt's career from her early days with The Stone Poneys, the 1970s where she helped forge the country-rock sound with classic renditions of songs by The Eagles, Jackson Brown, Warren Zevon, and into the 1980s where she bridged the New Wave Sound into hits with her chart-topping album, "Mad Love."




